"TWENTY FIVE GO MAD IN DEVON"

This was the Headline on Monday 1st July across the Honiton Evening Echo. Yes, The Nepo's had been in town with a world record touring party of 25.

GLASTONBURY 156-8 NCC 125-7

JACKSON 1000

For the first time in history a Nepotist passed the magical and, till now, mythical milestone of one thousand runs in a season. Bruce Jackson was that man. In years to come, those privileged enough to witness the six over cow corner which clocked up the grand, will be telling the next generation of young Nepo's all about it. He also passed Chris Leckenby's record all time run aggregate of 2380. It was fitting that it happened on the 118 year Old Putney common pitch. Past players who have graced its bumpy outfield include Jim Laker and Jack Hobbs and all in the last game of the season as well.

The match was dominated by Jacksons 98, but after the fielding display earlier in the day, all did not bode well. Four catches went down as Putney piled on the runs with some risky lofted strokes. After traipsing 3 miles across the heath to the tea shed the boys were pleasantly surprised by the marshmallows and jam scones with real cream. This tea meant that our reply to their 174 was somewhat delayed, thankfully Jacko and Stevie Bullough set into the opening bowlers with some gusto. They again passed 100 for the first wicket before Stevie B perished for a jug avoiding 44. Martyn played a stylish cameo to Jacko's oscar performance but Monk and Challinor both finished the season with blobs. Sadly Julie Jackson arrived late only to see her hero caught on the boundary for 98, he returned to the pavilion (!) bat raised acknowledging the thunderous applause of the mortals gathered to witness history. It was left to Peter Lennon to spank the winning run to round off a perfect day.

Grayshott 132-5 NCC 131-6

After losing the toss and fielding superbly to restrict the home side to 132, tea was enjoyed by the Nepo's and batting looked forward to. But it's a funny old game.

The four bowlers used were economical rather than penetrative, Rick Disneck 8-4-10-1, being the pick of the quartet. Our openers, Martyn and Worrall, started well enough with the former scoring 15 of the 20 partnership before, just for a change, getting caught off a leading edge. With 80 needed off the final 20 overs and 9 wickets in hand all appeared rosy in the Nepo camp.

Worrall, recalled to the side after a frustrating spell in the second team, started to take control. He blasted away off the front foot and was especially severe on their England U17 star paceman.

At the other end was Keith 'the sheriff' Scott, promoted up the order after being unable to force his way in as a bowler, he was beginning to get bogged down. This perhaps could be described as an understatement. With 41 required off 12 overs he decided that Kenny had been in for too long, and the words 'Yes No Yes No Sorry' echoed around the village green, Worrall run out for 42. Scott then took it upon himself to see the team home but only managed in missing five balls an over and getting a single off the sixth. Suddenly we needed 16 off 4 overs with Stocks and Challinor out mooing. Finally we required seven off the final over, 3 balls left and Scott was run out coming back for the fourth run. 3 to win off two balls, Elliott sneaked a single and it was left for Craig Gordon to be the hero or the villain ... he was bowled all over the place to grab a draw from the jaws of victory. Keith scored 30 runs in two hours, well played everyone!

NCC 196-4 OLD VICTORIANS 127-7

So near yet so far from victory. The final midweek game of the season saw the NCC in dominant mood, Disneck had selected a balanced side including the 'poached' run getter from Hampton Wick Royals. He put Jackson in charge who, as has become tradition this season, lost the toss. They inserted the boys, who batted well on a lively track, everyone got a few, the highlight being a partnership of 98 between Dave Stocks who scored his maiden Nepo 50, and Lodge (54). Elliott, Andrew and Golden were again economical but wickets were scarce and the Essex side hung on for a draw.

NCC 211-2 ELSTEAD 46-10

This was an innings of statistical delight. Jackson 109 in 71 minutes; 100 opening partnership in 60 mins; undefeated 3rd wicket partnership of 50 in 10 minutes; Bullough again getting out in the 40's; Exley not out 24 in Boundaries; biggest crowd of the season (7); a declaration at 3.55 p.m., 35 minutes before tea; 200 up in 1 hr 48 minutes: but the most amazing 'stat' was that after eleven seasons Tim Hardy took his maiden Nepotist wicket as Elstead crumbled all out for 46, this is the third time a side has made less than 50 against our Rabbitt catchers. Six of the seven bowlers used took a wicket, the other, Marvel, didn't concede a run. The whole match lasted 40 overs.

NCC 154-6 ETON CAVALIERS 141-8

From the ridiculous carrot munchers of Elstead to the historical delights of an Eton college pitch perfectly prepared and surrounded by trees and boys in tails and starched collars. England their England ... the playing fields of England ... tradition personified.

"Streuth, what a bunch of penguins" yes, unfortunately I was travelling in the Jackson butter box, a cultural void if ever there was.

The toss was won, the decision to bat a formality. But the batters were tested by supremely accurate seam bowling, a class about other opponents. Only Jackson (49) and Exley (32) looked comfortable as the score stumbled over the 100 mark. Fortunately a brisk 35 partnership from Martyn (14^{*}) and again Elliott (20^{*}) took the total passed 150 and respectability.

Things looked pretty grim as the Cavaliers set off in pursuit, with 100 needed off 20 overs and 8 wickets in hand Monk turned to Balden and the ball started turning over the square leg boundary! With 45 needed from the last 9 overs and 8 wickets still in hand, the skipper turned to experience. On came Jerry Mitchell and promptly turned the game back to the Nepo's, his 3-17 knocked the wind out of their sails and caused panic to set in. This led to two needless run outs aided by Stevie B and Ian Martyn. The final over started with 14 runs needed and two wickets remaining, Marvel bowled a maiden and the game was saved. A memorable match, it was good to see a bit of fight and spirit in the field as well.
